Message from the Campus Vice President...

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Greetings Campus Colleagues!

Welcome to the start the Fall 2017 semester! A lot has happened since May Commencement and I am happy—no, ecstatic—to report that enrollment is UP at the Lancaster Campus!

We have seen an increase in enrollment, particularly in our summer I and II sessions, strengthened by guest students. Summer enrollment compared to last year is up **4.4 percent**. For Fall 2017, our numbers continue to be strong, with the Sept. 4, 2017 report showing Lancaster enrollments **up 2.4 percent** from last year, and we are still processing our Dual Enrollment students. Congratulations to <u>ALL OF</u> <u>YOU</u> for your work in and out of the classroom engaging, advising and educating our students!

During the summer we also engaged in several academic and technology projects totaling just under \$280,000. These include:

- Main 330: Collaborative Classroom for Healthcare which includes a short throw interactive projector, multiple monitors and mobile furniture.
- Main 227: Presentation Room which includes a touch screen 70 inch panel, secondary 70 inch monitor, two 55 inch monitors, simplified Extron controller and new tables.
- East 218, 228, and 232: Biology Labs received new podium stations and iPad to support visual body software
- **East 326, 328, 329 and 330**: NEWLY renamed Technology Wing. This area of East will include the newly renovated CITE, 24 station iMac classroom, 24 station PC classroom, redesigned video conferencing room, updated open access 12 station computer lab, new collaborative learning classroom and new presentation room. The Tech Wing is also incorporating a new color palette to the classroom and hallway.

The above projects were ready for the start of the semester, but will be enhanced with some backordered equipment (coming in soon!!). Thank you to Information Technologies and the Facilities department for the extraordinary efforts in ensuring that these rooms were ready for the start of the fall semester.

The Campus is full of life and energy with the return of our faculty and students. I am encouraged by our progress and look forward to a successful school year.

STUDENT ART WORK



This work represents the efforts of students in **Drawing 1** and **Fundamentals of Two-Dimensional Design** classes at the Lancaster Campus of HACC, Central Pennsylvania's Community College. Some of the students were art majors and some were not. All were asked to explore many different ideas, techniques and approaches that the art world has determined to be important to understand and function in an art field.

One of the last class projects was a visit to the North Museum where students were asked to draw the taxidermy (stuffed birds) in the basement. It was a chance to take the art process out of the classroom and into a public space.

The program consists of a six-week summer session in which a select group of community college students (known as Bucknell Community College Scholars) will take two courses while living on Bucknell University's campus. The entire summer program, including credits earned while attending, comes at no cost to HACC or the selected HACC students.

The summer program is followed by mentoring and support for each scholar who chooses to apply for admission as a transfer student to Bucknell. Those granted admission, and who enroll in the University, will receive a full-tuition scholarship, along with individual plans tailored to meet their needs, assistance with transfer of credits and mentorship. Students will return to HACC at the end of this summer to complete their associate degrees.

Over the past 10 years, HACC has seen 67 students attend the summer program and over 30 students go on to Bucknell full-time. We estimate that Bucknell University has invested over \$4 million in HACC students over the past decade.

According to an article on *Lancaster Online*, Kathy Granbois, United Way Board Chair, states that the financial "definition of poverty is a family of four with an annual income of \$24,250." She adds that "Nearly 55,000 people in Lancaster County live on that wage or less. That's more than 1 in 10."

"Bringing communities together to get them talking, and creating relationships of mutual respect," said Holt. That is what the United Way has begun, and their hope is to reach the goal of decreasing poverty by half by 2025.

The positive review was submitted by Grave Cavalieri (an important contemporary poet) in the **Washington Independent Review of Books**.

The Wrack Line by Pat Hanahoe-Dosch. FutureCycle Press. 85 pages.

"The emotional world has seldom been better described in a book about other countries and a drive across our own; and, she takes a social conscience with her, along with a literary talent whipping poetry clean. The unfortunate do not go unnoticed: the waitress who gets rewarded at the end of the day with a beer — the black boy with his arms raised high in surrender. Hanahoe -Dosch is a natural born poet with a command of lyric power that's impressive. It's not easy to fold social progress into a view of the pyramids or a lonely street in New Orleans. "Being present" takes on new meaning with this woman's skill set. She wraps ideas in a personal context so easily the words seem to write themselves into harmony."
