A previous donation from Select Medical enabled HACC to construct the Select Medical Health Education Pavilion, which today houses healthcare education and training on HACC's Harrisburg Campus.

### **White House environmental adviser visits HACC**

Nancy Sutley, chair of the White House Council on Environmental Quality, got a bird's-eye view of successful green jobs training programs during a visit recently to HACC. These programs, many of which receive federal and state funding, use American-manufactured equipment to train students for jobs cleaning up and restoring contaminated properties, installing solar electric systems, and conducting energy efficiency upgrades. HACC's environmental technician program, for example, is funded by a federal Environmental Protection Agency grant. Another program for unemployed or underemployed workers who are interested in a career in green technology is funded by a grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry State Energy Sector Partnership.
