

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

2012 theme is "Black Women in American: Culture and History."



Carter G. Woodson, an NAACP leader, educator and historian, established Black History Week to recognize the central role Blacks played in the development of the nation. The first celebration occurred on Feb. 12, 1926. The second week of February was set aside for this celebration to coincide with the birthdays of abolitionist Frederick Douglass and President Abraham Lincoln. In 1976, the week was expanded to Black History Month.

FACULTY PROFILES ~ a few minutes with....



Trum Simmons
Senior Professor, English

What are your academic credentials? B.A. in English, Taylor University(1965); M.A. in English, Vanderbilt University(1970)

How would you describe your teaching philosophy? I believe in what some call the open classroom. I give my students a six-page "Syllabus" outlining my teaching

philosophy, which might be called the freedom to learn. I've been heavily influenced by people like Carl Rogers, Neil Postman, Herbert Kohl, and John Holt, among others.

What do you view as your most significant impact on students and the college? Throughout my 41 years here I have tried to bring together the academic and the student affairs/student life spheres. I see "student activities" as co-curricular, not extra-curricular. In advising the student newspaper for 40 years I have promoted freedom of speech and freedom of the press. My colleagues will testify to my strong defense of academic freedom for faculty and students over the years. As faculty president in 1982-83 and 1997-1999 I was an activist advocate for faculty. And I have created three courses the curriculum, Women Writers, Banned Books, and Intro to Lesbian and Gay Studies.

What are some of your most memorable times at HACC? The Student Streak in March of 1974 is certainly one. A group of naked students ran a football play on the quad and then dispersed to their cars. Several times The Fourth Estate was attacked for its coverage, as in the infamous Sex Special in 1997. Everyone on campus learned a great deal through the fallout from that issue. Other memorable events include the many times student leaders have pressed the College to make changes in things like student evaluation of faculty and take steps to improve student participation in shared governance.

Are there other things about yourself that you would like stated in your profile? Sometimes students and colleagues call me an old hippy because of my teaching philosophy and my involvement with students both in and outside the classroom. Yes, I was there in the late 60s, and yes, I remember them well. That's where I learned about treating everyone equally and about the need for more love in the world. I don't see myself as a hippy, but I did wear love beads back in the day, and would be glad to tell you about my time with Allen Ginsburg one warm spring evening in 1967.

When The Buzz graciously invited me to share some memories about the early years at

HACC, my initial reaction was, "Now you have hounded me beyond the limits of human endurance".

Of course, I love to reminisce about HACC. I remember when Hurricane Agnes put this campus under almost two feet of water; when it receded, there were catfish from the Susquehanna lying on the grass in front of Blocker Hall!

But my favorite memories are of my students. Bopha, a Cambodian by birth, was the sole survivor of a Pol Pot death camp. Linda, a single mom raising three children, two of them with cerebral palsy, was another A student in Bio. 121. Neither woman ever complained. Students like these are true heroes to me, and there have been many others like them through the years. I am very proud of them all. What a privilege it has been to be their teacher.

When I began, HACC had fewer than 500 students. My, how we have grown! Of the 14 community colleges in Pennsylvania, HACC was the first, and with its many talented teachers and supportive administrators, we are still the best. Sometimes, though, I wonder what might have become of students like Bopha and Linda if HACC had not been here for them.



Did You Know?

We have a Fish Whisperer on campus? That's right... our very own **Deb Ennis**, Assistant Director of Nursing and Senior Professor, Nursing is just that! Read Deb's story below and you'll agree with the nickname.

The story, in Deb's own words, goes like this:

"I have an empty fish tank - lost my last fish a year ago and just had not replaced it yet. Over Christmas break I asked a colleague if she would like me to put her beta in my tank so he could stay warm - was worried about him with the electricity going off over break.

She said yes and off we went for break. He did fine over break, but I came in to my office on Sunday before classes started and found him in part of the filter - all that could be seen of him was his tail - I was sure he was dead.

So I took my filter apart with the intent of extracting him and low and behold he was alive - he wiggled around and swam out of the filter, but on the way out he injured his back and belly - scraped them up pretty bad. I went on line and looked up how to help him - it seems that in Thailand they fight these fish and when they are injured they put almond leaves in their water - they are pretty resilient. So I purchased Beta Fix, which is the equivalent of antibiotics for fish and has the almond leaf extract in it. I also added salt to his tank - that also helps them heal.

A month later - he is healed and eating very well - and my colleague has given him to me because she said I was such a good mother to him. Don't know how long he will live; he still had a gouge out of his back which is healed - looks like someone bit him - but he is doing well. He is funny - when I walk in my office in the morning he gets so excited - he flairs his fins and actually swims back and forth in excitement to see me - they are funny fish - other fish could care less."

Our mild winter has fooled our bulbs and perennials into thinking they are growing in a temperate English garden, where winters traditionally have a brief hold on the landscape. Here at HACC, we continue to enjoy the novelty of flowers in February (as of this writing, anyway – winter can be cruel and send us a cold blast, forcing itself back into the landscape). Two more beauties to enjoy during your campus strolls:



Snowdrops (*Galanthus nivalis*) location: Carillon garden areas at the pond's edge. Porcelain white bells painted with green "hearts" give snowdrops a delicate appearance that belies their hardiness. These reliable little bloomers return each year in late winter and often mimic patches of snow tucked under trees and shrubs. They are useful as well as beautiful; the drug Galantamine, used in the treatment of Alzheimer's disease, was derived originally from the Snowdrop.

Lenten Rose (*Helleborus orientalis*) location: west library patio under the locust trees; Whitaker alcove under the windows. The Lenten Roses, or Hellebores, are the first perennial to bloom on campus. Fat buds appear as Lent approaches and continue to develop even through severe cold snaps. The buds are low, often hidden among last year's foliage, but once the sun warms them they quickly develop on bright green stems. Leafless, exposed, they are a miracle of tenacity as they continue towards blooming. Shades from ivory to deep plum are a treat for winter-weary eyes. Their cousins *H. odoratus* and *H. foetidus* push up chartreuse columns of buds in the Odom Fern Glen.

Coeur a la Crème (Heart of Cream)

8 oz package of cream cheese
 ½ cup confectioner's powdered sugar
 1 tsp vanilla
 1 pt heavy cream, whipped, or 1 package of whipped topping prepared
 (this is my preference—lower fat and tastes really good)

Beat the cream cheese until light. Add sugar and vanilla and continue beating. Carefully fold in the whipped cream or cream topping. Line a heart shaped mold with dampened cheesecloth, and add mixture. Refrigerate 6-12 hours. Serve with strawberries, other sweetened fruit (like blueberries) or jam.

What is "Mardi Gras" ([mardigras](#)) *Mardi gras* is French for **Fat Tuesday**, referring to the practice of the last night of eating richer, fatty foods before the ritual fasting of the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday; in English the day is sometimes referred to as **Shrove Tuesday**, from the word *shrive*, meaning "confess." Related popular practices are associated with celebrations before the fasting and religious obligations associated with the penitential season of Lent. Popular practices include wearing masks and costumes, overturning social conventions, dancing, sports competitions, parades, and GREAT food! In many areas, the term "Mardi Gras" has come to mean the whole period of activity related to the celebratory events, beyond just the single day. Need a good Fat Tuesday recipe? Try the one below....

CHICKEN & SAUSAGE JAMBALAYA

6	bacon slices, chopped	½	cup garlic flavored barbecue sauce
1½	cups sliced celery	1	teaspoon salt
1	cup uncooked long-grain rice	¼	teaspoon cayenne pepper
1	cup chopped onion	1½	cups diced cooked chicken
1	cup chopped green bell pepper		
1	can (14½ ounces) tomatoes		
½	pound cooked smoked sausage, cut into ½ inch pieces		
1½	cups water		

1. In 3-quart Dutch oven or large deep skillet, fry bacon until crisp
2. Stir in celery, rice, onion, and green pepper. Cook and stir 5 minutes.
3. Add un-drained tomatoes, sausage, water, barbecue sauce, salt and cayenne. Stir. Bring to a boil. Cover. Simmer 20 minutes, stirring frequently. Add chicken.

Makes 4 servings.

TIPS:

Prep takes forever, but it is well worth the trouble.

Doubling the recipe works fine.

You can use seafood instead of (or with) the sausage and/or chicken.

No matter how strange it seems to add uncooked rice to bacon grease, it really works out well.

(Do not use minute rice.)

As this cooks (over medium heat), watch it closely as it tends to stick easily.


First Annual Computer Technology Career Night




ROSE LEHRMAN ARTS CENTER NEWS
