Patient Care Concepts is a new course in the HACC Academy at the York Campus. This course introduces concepts that are common to all patient care careers and gives the students a



chance to have a hands on simulated patient care experience. The students have taken care of an Ebola patient in a simulated care environment; learned patient assessment; given wound care and have learned to save a patient's life using CPR and an Automatic Electronic Defibrillator.

The College-wide CITE event was held on the York campus on January 15, 2015, and it was a huge success! Below is an excerpt from the e-mail received from Jason Beaudin, the Chair of the College-Wide Center for Innovation and Teaching Excellence, with details of the success of this event.

"Every individual I worked with on the York team - Tom, Doeline, David, Justin and so many others – were all upbeat, professional, and fantastically helpful. They were all quick to point out that your leadership was vital to the success of the unit, as well.

I've taken the liberty of copying Ski on this email, as he held a session during Tuesday's Curriculum Day where we took a moment to appreciate those around the college who have gone above and beyond in the pursuit of excellence. While our event was held after that, I thought he might be interested in a late addition.

Here are some bits of information I thought you might like to enjoy, based on our early assessment data:

- This was the largest audience we have had at a CITE event: 221 attendees, and over 20 additional unregistered presenters.
- Despite cramming more people than ever into a space, **over 98%** of our early responses indicate that the facilities were adequate. This, more than anything, speaks to how finely tuned everything was making this event run smoothly in a space taxed almost to its limits of seating is a very impressive feat.
- 100% (yes, that's ONE HUNDRED PERCENT!!) of early responses indicate that this event was well organized. Much of the credit for this really belongs to the many teams that support the event behind the scenes, and yours is chief among them.

Thank you, again, for helping to make our optional event at the end of a busy week such a success. One faculty member called it the "best of all of the 3 days of events for '0' week," while another wrote that it was "the best professional development day I've ever attended at HACC.""

BIAS TRAINING



Melissa Plotkin from the Jewish Community Center (JCC) presented a Bias Awareness Training for the faculty. As we deal with a diverse body of students we know that prejudice is learned; everyone prejudges. It begins with "little acts of bias" such as jokes, rumors, stereotyping, insensitive remarks, non-inclusive language, screening out positive information about groups of

people to accept the negative, and justifying bias by seeking out like minded people. If not kept in check, these biases turn into prejudice and bigotry. Name calling, ridiculing, scapegoating, labeling, social avoidance and de-humanization can occur. This can lead to discrimination, harassment and social exclusion. A person doesn't have to like someone or believe what that person believes in; but as human beings, we need to respoce the differences and agree to disagree.

STUDENT AFFAIRS INCUBATOR PROJECTS

This year, as part of the strategic planning process for the division of student affairs, staff were asked to suggest pilot projects to further enrollment, student success, or an interesting assessment idea. Staff suggested over twenty projects college-wide and were offered strategic planning funds to implement their project. **Three projects are being piloted here in York:**

• Shelly Blanchette and Samantha Shoup are piloting remote advising appointments using cameras, headsets, and skype or adobe connect. This project will allow students, whose schedules limit their ability to come to campus for a meeting, to meet with their advisor "face to face" while on a break at work or from their home. We anticipate all advisors and counselors being equipped to offer this service.



- Shelly Blanchette is also piloting offering added personal assessments to students on academic probation. The assessments will guide students in determining reasons for their academic standing and strategies for creating academic success behaviors.
- Heather Burns is working with the entire counseling and advising department to develop a drop-in advising space. This new space, near the check-in desk, will offer student immediate advising help at the counter and will be offered all day.

GODSPELL ON STAGE

HACC Theatre will present Stephen Schwartz's "Godspell" on stage in the Rose Lehrman Arts Center Theatre in March. Performances are scheduled March 5-7 at 7:30 p.m. and March 8 at 2 p.m.

"Godspell" is a masterful retelling of the original sensation, injected with contemporary pop-culture references and dazzling new arrangements of Schwartz's score. Based on the Gospel According to St. Matthew, a small group helps Jesus Christ tell different parables by using a variety of games, storytelling techniques and comic timing. An eclectic blend of songs ranging in style from pop to vaudeville is employed as the story of Jesus's life dances across the stage.

The production is directed by Dave Olmsted, HACC's resident scenic designer and theatre instructor, and music direction is by Genevieve Karki, adjunct instructor of music. The 2012 revised version of "Godspell" is presented through special arrangement with Music Theatre International, which also provided all authorized performance materials.
