Lemonade Stand Pie



1/3 cup Country Time Lemonade, Strawberry or Raspberry Lemonade Flavor Drink Mix

1/2 cup water

1 pint (2 cups) vanilla ice cream, softened

1 tub (8 oz.) Cool Whip Whipped Topping, thawed

1 prepared Nabisco Honey Maid Graham Pie Crust (6 oz. or 9 in.)

STIR drink mix and water until dissolved.

BEAT lemonade mixture and ice cream in large bowl with electric mixer on low speed until blended. Gently stir in whipped topping until smooth. Freeze until mixture mounds, if necessary. Spoon into crust.

FREEZE 4 hours or overnight until firm. Let stand at room temperature 15 minutes or until pie can be

Socks & Shoes

Poodle skirts, Elvis and 1950s memorabilia awaited us in Cross Keys, PA, where the Senior Day Center had been transformed into an awesome Sock Hop and 50s diner taking us all back to a bygone era. **Cathy Rosenkrans**, her son, **Seth**, and **I** got to spend the day with the residents of the Cross Keys Village Brethren Home. Our day began with 50s trivia...did you know the first toy ever marketed to children was Mr. Potato Head beginning in 1952?!? Next, we moved on to lots of different games played alongside the residents.

The folks at Day Center didn't let us go hungry either! Hotdogs and chips were served to all of us and the residents in adorable French fry baskets along with bottles of Coca Cola. Then, it was time to dance the afternoon away with a guest appearance from Elvis Presley and lessons in jitterbugging, the locomotion, the swim, the mashed potato and many others. Next, it was on to hula hooping. The day ended with everyone (including us) being thoroughly pooped while we sipped on our milkshakes and listened to the sounds of the 50s.

When we returned from our day of service, we were greeted with kind words from Corinne Peterson, the contact at the Cross Keys Village. She said in an email to the United Way organizers, "I think they enjoyed themselves as much as our residents did. Are we able to get them back again next year?" Corinne was spot on! We had a fantastic day, came away with a new bunch of friends, and are looking forward to going back to visit them again next year!



Back in York, **Heather Burns** was working with the Shoe Organizing/Matching Project at Shadowfax. Shadowfax provides residential and vocational services to people with mental health and intellectual disabilities. Her project was in the vocational training facility where a Shadowfax staff member, Dustin, explained that Shadowfax has a contract with the Clarks® shoe company to match single shoes back into pairs. Clarks® sends right shoe samples to sales staff east of the Mississippi and left shoe samples to staff in the West. Both groups send single shoes to Shadowfax to be matched with the other shoe. Shadowfax then boxes up and sends matched pairs back to Clarks® to receive a certain reimbursement per matched pair.

A volunteer crew started the project in the morning and matched approximately 100 pairs of shoes. Heather's afternoon volunteer crew consisted of four members of the United Way's Emerging Leader Society (which includes Heather) and three volunteers from Metro Bank. They unpacked single left shoes,

matched those lefts with rights already warehoused at Shadowfax, placed pairs into shoeboxes, and then packed shoeboxes into larger shipping boxes. The afternoon crew matched and packed 192 pairs (far outpacing the morning crew – not that they were competing or anything!). A Shadowfax staff member told Heather's group that their work had earned Shadowfax approximately \$1400.
