College-Wide

Since the Spring 2001 term, enrollment has increased from the previous year and 2009 was no exception. Overall headcount (HC) grew by 6.7% as 19,363 students enrolled in the Spring 2009 semester compared to 18,152 in 2008. The number attending full time (FT) increased from 6,347 in the Spring 2008 term to 6,934 in 2009 (9.2%). Totals for part time (PT) students expanded by 5.3% (2008 = 11,805 students versus 2009 = 12,429 students). In keeping with the total HC growth, the number of FTEs was 7.2% higher than the previous spring (2008 = 12,304.2 FTE vs. 2009 = 13,186.3 FTE). All HC and FTE totals represent new spring term highs for HACC.

A review of selected demographics showed that females continued to comprise nearly two out of three students (12,555/19,363 or 64.8%). This was little changed from the 65.4% female proportion in 2008.

Comparison by ethnicity/race from the previous year cannot be completed since a new reporting format was adopted to meet federal requirements. As such, instead of a single question with six categories, the new structure consists of two questions — the first determining Hispanic origin followed by the second requesting race.

Employing the new format, 1,441 students (7.3%) indicated that they were of Hispanic origin. By race, African Americans constituted 2,053 students (10.6%), Asians totaled 635 (3.3%), and American Indians numbered 194 (1.0%). The new "Mixed" race category was checked by 1,327 students (6.9%). In the new reporting structure, if one checked the Hispanic option, the race question (second) must also be answered. Thus, there are students who are Black Hispanics, White Hispanics, and others of Hispanic origin. Care must be exercised in regards to comparing past and present "race/ethnicity" totals given the new multiple question reporting structure.

The career programs remain the most popular, as nearly three in five (58.7%) chose this option. Just over a quarter (27.8%) selected one of the transfer majors while the remainder (13.5%) was identified in General Studies. Following past patterns, the most popular career programs were in Nursing (both RN and LPN), Business Management, and Early Childhood Education. Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice remained the top transfer majors in terms of enrollment.

Harrisburg Campus

Overall HC at the Harrisburg Campus was up by 3.5%, from 9,168 students in 2008 to 9,490 in 2009. This was led by a 7.8% increase in FT enrollment (2008 = 3,406 vs. 2009 = 3,671) and a much smaller 1.0%

jump with the PT population (2008 = 5,762 vs. 2009 = 5,819). Total FTE increased by 4.8% (2008 = 6,314.8 vs. 2009 = 6,615.7), reflecting the larger role played by students enrolled on a FT basis, given the overall 3.5% HC increase compared to the 7.8% FT growth.

Females comprised three in five (5,740/9,490 or 60.5%) of all Harrisburg students, not unlike the previous year (2008 = 61.6%). Again, employing the new ethnicity/race reporting format, 503 (5.3%) of Harrisburg students were of Hispanic origin. Among the racial group, 121 (12.8%) were African Americans, 367 (3.9%) Asians, and 76 (0.8%) American Indians. A total of 635 (6.7%) checked the Mixed race category.

By program, career majors (56.8%) nearly doubled the transfer (28.7%) total. This continued recent past patterns. Nursing (RN and LPN), Business Management, and Computer Information Systems were the largest career majors while Business Administration, Criminal Justice, and Elementary Education topped the transfer options. Neither differs greatly from the 2008 findings.

Gettysburg Campus

Enrollment at the Gettysburg Campus rose a strong 14.0% (2008 = 1,469 vs. 2009 = 1,674). This was the result of a 16.0% increase among FT students (2008 = 445 vs. 2009 = 516) and a 13.1% rise in the PT population (2008 = 1,024 vs. 2009 = 1,158). As a result, total FTE was 12.9% higher (2008 = 981.3 vs. 2009 = 1,107.8) compared to the previous year. The smaller FTE increase compared to the three percentages for enrollment (i.e., total, FTE, and PT) means that the average student course load did not grow.

The proportion of females at Gettysburg remained very high as they constituted more than seven in ten (1,190/1,674 or 71.1%) of the enrollment total. This did not change significantly from 2008 (72.0%).

Gettysburg students who identified themselves as Hispanic comprised 5.1% (N = 86) of the enrollment, but when racial type was reviewed the aggregate for African Americans (N = 38 or 2.2%), Asians (N = 25 or 1.5%), and American Indians (N = 18 or 1.1%) was less than the Hispanic figure. Interestingly, the largest non-White racial group reported was "Mixed" (115/1,674 or 6.9%). These minority results exceeded those associated with the general Adams County population, as it remains overwhelmingly White.

More than six in ten (62.5%) Gettysburg students selected a career program while a quarter (25.7%) of the population chose a transfer major. Similar to other campuses, Nursing (RN and LPN) and Business Management topped the career programs while Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice were the enrollment leaders for the transfer option. For the most part, all of these findings mirrored what was uncovered the previous year.

Lancaster Campus

Enrollment at the Lancaster Campus was nearly flat, as 4,621 students were counted in 2009 compared to 4,590 in 2008. This represents a modest 0.7% growth. However, a dichotomous relationship was apparent in the Spring 2009 enrollment pattern. In terms of FT students, a 9.9% increase (2008 = 1,469 vs. 2009 = 1,614) was registered. However, the PT population declined by 3.7% (2008 = 3,121 vs. 2009 = 3,007). This finding was unexpected given that historically this segment (PT students) of the enrollment increases during difficult economic times, as is the current case. The strong FT growth helped to push the FTE total up by 3.2% (2008 = 3,027.5 vs. 2009 = 3,124.7).

Just over two-thirds (3,120/4,621 or 67.5%) of all students were females, nearly matching the Spring 2008 proportion (68.9%) and continuing a trend whereby women were more likely to enroll. Given the large Hispanic population in Lancaster County, it comes as no surprise that 11.7% (539/4,621) of the students said they fell into this category. By race, African Americans made up the largest minority group (N = 410 or 8.9%) followed by Asians (N = 189 or 4.1%) and then American Indians (N = 70 or 1.5%). Similar to the other campuses, those who checked "Mixed" race (N = 223 or 4.8%) constituted a fairly large group.

Career programs remained the most popular, enrolling nearly three in five (58.3%) students, while just over a quarter (28.7%) selected one of the transfer majors. The Nursing programs (RN and LPN) had the most career majors, followed by Radiologic Technology and Early Childhood Education. For students in one of the transfer curricula (28.7% of total), the largest groups were Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Psychology.

Lebanon Campus

The Lebanon Campus enrollment expanded by 11.3% from the previous spring term (2008 = 1,053 vs. 2009 = 1,172), with nearly all of the increase attributed to the PT population. This group was up a very strong 17.5% (2008 = 674 vs. 2009 = 792) while the FT segment remained stagnant with an increase of only 0.3% (2008 = 379 vs. 2009 = 380). The average course load of a Lebanon student declined as

evidenced by the FTE total, which was up only 4.1% (vs. 11.3% for total HC), due primarily to the large PT HC growth (2008 = 707.3 vs. 2009 = 736.1).

While females constituted 62.9% of all students (737/1,172), this was a decline from the 2008 figure of 68.1%. A total of 10.5% (123/1,172) identified themselves as Hispanics while the number of racial minorities was generally small, a reflection of the county total population. African Americans comprised the largest group at 5.5% (64/1,172) followed by Asians (14/1,172 or 1.2%) and then American Indians (13/1,172 or 1.1%).

Most Lebanon students (62.1%) selected one of the career program options while nearly a quarter (24.5%) opted for one of the transfer majors. RN Nursing, United Brotherhood of Carpenters Apprentice Program, and Business Studies led the way among the career options while Elementary Education, Business Administration, and Criminal Justice were the largest transfer majors. The results followed both college-wide trends and recent historical patterns.

York Campus

Beginning its second spring term as a branch campus, York continued to grow. The overall increase was 28.5% when compared to last spring (2008 = 1,872 vs. 2009 = 2,406) and it was fueled by strong increases with both FT and PT students. The FT population rose 16.2% (2008 = 648 vs. 2009 = 753) while the PT total was up 35.0% (2008 = 1,224 vs. 2009 = 1,653). These very high rates translated to a 25.8% increase in FTE from spring to spring (2008 = 1,273.3 vs. 2009 = 1,602.1).

The York Campus had the highest proportion of females of any campus, with 73.5% (1,768/2,406). This was nearly an exact match to the 2008 results (73.3%). The reported number of Hispanic students came to 7.9% (190/2,406) while African Americans made up the largest racial minority group at 13.8% (331/2,406). Asians followed at 1.7% (40/2,406) and then American Indians at 0.7% (17/2,406). The high African American enrollment reflects somewhat the county data, but more likely the York City demographics which hold a higher percentage of minorities.

More than three in five (62.9%) students selected one of the career/technical majors while one in four (25.1%) were in transfer programs. Neither of these results differs greatly from 2008, nor did the choices for most popular career and transfer majors. For the former, the two Nursing (RN and LPN) again topped the list, followed by Business Management. For the latter, Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice remained the most popular.

Summary

College-wide HC continued to expand (6.7%) and this was also the case with growth at each of the branch campuses. However, at the campus level, the increases varied greatly from one location to another. York Campus, HACC's newest, again earned the highest increase at 28.5% while Lancaster simply held steady with a small growth of 0.7%.

Somewhat unexpectedly, given these difficult economic times when historically PT enrollment grew, FT students made the largest gain college-wide (9.2% vs. 5.3% PT). Females continued to make up nearly two in three (64.8%) students, similar to the past year. With a new two-question ethnicity/race format, 7.4% of the students indicated they were of Hispanic origin. By race, African Americans comprised one in ten (2,053/19,363 or 10.6%) of the student population.

Career programs remained the major of choice for many, and this was especially true of the two nursing options (RN and LPN). For those planning to transfer, Business Administration was the top selection.

In summary, besides the actual HC increases, the student population characteristics remained very consistent from spring to spring. The 19,363 students established a new record high for the spring term.

Appendix – Virtual Campus

Enrollment at the Virtual Campus (VC) continued to expand, as total HC was up by 14.8% (2008 = 4,266 vs. 2009 = 4,896). This was the result of a 20.7% (2008 = 1,406 vs. 2009 = 1,697) increase in FT students and an 11.8% (2008 = 2,860 vs. 2009 = 3,199) rise in the PT population. The 4,896 VC students produced 7,789 course registrations (2008 = 6,683), an increase of 16.5%, and these courses generated 23,158 credits (2008 = 19,652), up 17.8% from spring to spring.

Females again made up nearly three of every four (72.2%) students, and this mirrored the 2008 finding (72.7%). Employing the new ethnicity/race format, 5.3% (N = 260) checked the Hispanic origin response while African Americans constituted the largest minority group (411/4,896 or 8.4%) followed by Asians (106/4,896 or 2.2%) and American Indians (36/4,896 or 0.7%). The new "Mixed" race category was checked by 1.6% (N = 76) of the VC population. Finally, overall mean age was 28.1 years, not unlike the 2008 figure of 28.5 years.

While 4,896 students were enrolled in at least one VC course, just over a third (1,729/4,896 or 35.3%) were solely online students (2008 = 36.8%). This continued a trend which saw most VC students selecting both the online and traditional classroom instructional formats. Not surprisingly, Dauphin County residents enrolled the most VC students (N = 1,050) followed by York (N = 981) and then Lancaster (N = 957). The VC courses remain very popular with students in HACC's primary service area.

In summary, the rapid growth of the VC has not abated and double digit percentage increases remained the norm. While total HC has changed dramatically from year to year, demographic traits have been fairly consistent and nearly two-thirds of the VC population was also registered for traditional classroom instruction. The VC courses continued to serve multiple roles and purposes.
